Cumulative Effects

The NRESi continued to participate in theitnistitute partnershipereated Cumulative Impacts Research Consortium (CIRC) which was established in 2015 as a platform for research and community dialogue on the cumulative impacts of resource de Peace Fish and Wildlife Compensation Program Lectures

For the past number of years, NRESi has partnered with the Peace Fish and Wildlife Compensation Program to put on a lecture that has themes related to the natural resourc around the Peace regionand Williston Reservoir. Fipeesentations were delivered this yea one in Prince George, and tweach in two other communities in the Northeastern region of the ProvinceDr. Kari StuarSmith (Canadian Forest Products Ltd) presented informationment management efforts developed by several forest companies in the interior of BC related to the Migratory Bird Convention Act and Ryan Bichon (Mackenzie Nature Observatory) spoke about the on-going work at the Mugaha Bird Band station to an audience of 381 the Mackenzie Recreation Centre on November, 32016. On March 8, 2017 George Desjarlais (West Moberly First Nations) spoke about the decline in ungulate populations in the west fathe Williston Reservoir as obserdedy Elders from the West Moberly First Nations and Scott McNay (Wildlife Infometrics Inc.) spoke about the research that he and his associates have undertaken on the status of caribou in the area around the reservoir. Approximately 20 people attended the talk at the LIDO that re in Fort St John. The final speaker in the FWCP sponsored lectures was Dr. Steven Cookfeom Carlton University in Ottawa, Ontario. Dr. Cooke spoke on March 22, 2017 aboutmonitoring and research involvingeshwater fish to an audience of over 40 the Prince George, UNBC campus.

ScholarshipFunds

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Our 2016/2017year-end operating fund closing balance was 7\$4,674. The financial situation for NRES in as improved over last year. Perating fund expenditures in 2016/17 exceeded revenues by only \$28,020 (Table 5), while overall funds at year end were \$621,310, down \$7,324 from the previous yearnd (Table 9) Proposed expenditures for 2017/2018 will be very similar, again drawing down the operating fund reserve by ca. \$27,000.

Revenue for the institute deriver mainly from the reallocation of research overhead by members, which totaled \$15,569 in 2016/2017, up fr\$93,835 in 2015/2016NREScontinues to work towards new funding opportunities such as our participation in the Fish and Wildlife Compensation Program project to reduce the drawdown of our operating fund.

Our second largest endowment fund is the Northwoendowment, which is used to fund the NRESi Annual Lecture series of other special events consistent with the original intent of the endowment. In years when the return on the endowment has been low (or even negative), NRESi's operating budgees been used to fund such activities in order to maintain an adequate balance in the endowment this year, the Northwoodendowmentearned\$9,349 in interest (Table 7).
